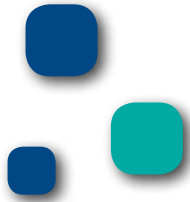

Robert Merry Lecturer Award

Friday, June 10, 2011

Gilbert Vergilio, RRT (A), MEd

The Robert Merry Lecturer Award was established to honor a respiratory therapist from any area of the field, who has exhibited vision, leadership and innovation to further develop respiratory care in Canada. The award recognizes Robert Merry and his accomplishments in the field of respiratory therapy in Canada. Robert Merry was one of the eight founding fathers of the CSRT. He and seven others established the CSRT in 1964 when Robert was the department head at Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal. In fact, before the CSRT was established, Montreal was a chapter in the American Respiratory Therapists Association. Robert Merry left Montreal in the late sixties and created the school of Respiratory Therapy at Fanshawe College in London, Ontario. At the time of his retirement in 1986, it was noted that every RT was either a direct graduate or someone Robert had trained. In addition, Robert was the first CSRT journal editor and he acted as the CSRT historian. Robert had an important role in the CSRT and his dedication to the RT profession was unmatched. His influence had a strong and far-reaching impact on the RT profession.

The 2011 recipient of the Robert Merry Lecturer Award is Gilbert Vergilio, Quality Improvement and Patient Safety Consultant at Fraser Health Authority, Surrey, BC.

He graduated from Fanshawe College in 1972 where Robert Merry was program coordinator, one of his teachers and mentor. He joined the faculty and taught respiratory technology with Robert Merry at Fanshawe College from 1977-1979.

In July 1980, Gil Vergilio moved to Kamloops BC as one of the first faculty hired for the new provincial program for Respiratory Therapy at Cariboo College in Kamloops. He served as President of the BCSRT in 1985 at which time he facilitated titles protection legislation for RT's (1988) and coordinated the move of Respiratory Therapists into a more professional union (1989). He served on the CSRT Board of Directors from 1985 to 1993 holding the positions of BC rep, Vice-President, President-Elect, President and Past President. He also served in other capacities including Education Coordinator and Chairman of the Board of the CJRT.

Gil was instrumental in coordinating the move of the CSRT head office from Winnipeg to Ottawa and the hiring of the first full time Executive Director. More recently he served as President of the BCSRT from 2008 to 2010 and engaged the Society in active discussions with the Ministry of Health and BC employers on the need for a regulatory process for Respiratory Therapists in BC.

Gilbert Vergilio received his general advanced certification from the CSRT in 1994; developed clinical services for RT's at St Paul's Hospital resulting in a full scope job description for RT's and growth of the service from a staff of 11 to a staff of 50. He also expanded the role of the RT into advanced clinical practice in the cardiac sciences at St Pauls Hospital (Cath Lab and Perfusion).

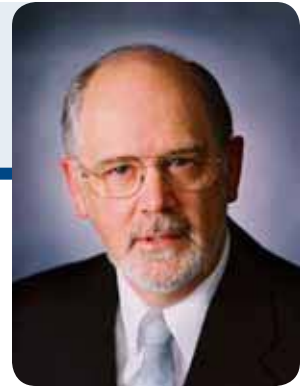
Throughout his career Gil has held several leadership positions in both health care and health education, including his current position in the Fraser Health Authority as a Quality Improvement Consultant where he works on regional improvement initiatives. Gil has served as an accreditation surveyor for Accreditation Canada over the past 15 years and is also currently an Education Consultant for the Canadian Healthcare Association.

He currently holds a Masters degree from Simon Fraser University's faculty of Education with a major in Administrative Leadership, has completed formal studies in quality management and has also completed health administration studies at the University of Saskatchewan.

Conférencier Robert Merry Le vendredi 10 juin 2011 Gilbert Vergilio, TRA (A), M.Éd.



Le prix du conférencier Robert Merry a été établi pour honorer un thérapeute respiratoire, un visionnaire, un leader et un innovateur qui a fait avancer les soins respiratoires au Canada. Le prix rappelle à notre mémoire les accomplissements de Robert Merry en thérapie respiratoire au pays. Robert Merry fut l'un des huit membres fondateurs de la SCTR. Ensemble, ces membres ont fondé la Société en 1964 alors que Robert était chef de département à l'hôpital Royal Victoria de Montréal. Avant l'établissement de la SCTR, Montréal constituait une division de l'American Respiratory Therapists Association. Robert Merry a quitté Montréal à la fin des années soixante et a fondé l'école de thérapie respiratoire du collège Fanshawe de London en Ontario. Au moment de sa retraite en 1986, on a constaté que chaque TR avait été un étudiant de Robert ou avait été formé par lui dans une certaine mesure. De plus, Robert a été le premier rédacteur du Journal et le premier historien de la Société. Robert a joué un rôle immense dans la SCTR et son dévouement à l'égard de la profession a été sans borne. Il a exercé une influence d'envergure sur la profession de TR.

Le conférencier Robert Merry de 2011 est Gilbert Vergilio, consultant en amélioration de la qualité et en sécurité des patients à la Fraser Health Authority, Surrey, BC.

Il a obtenu son diplôme du collège Fanshawe en 1972 alors que Robert Merry y était coordinateur de programmes, un de ses professeurs et son mentor. Il s'est joint au personnel du collège et a enseigné la technologie de la thérapie respiratoire avec Robert de 1977 à 1979.

En juillet 1980, Gil Vergilio s'est installé à Kamloops en Colombie-Britannique à titre d'un des premiers enseignants du nouveau programme provincial de thérapie respiratoire du collège Cariboo. Il a été élu président de la BCSRT en 1985 et durant son mandat, il a contribué à la loi de la protection des titres des TR (1988) et coordonné la transformation du groupe des thérapeutes respiratoires en un syndicat professionnel (1989). Il a siégé au conseil d'administration de la SCTR de 1985 à 1993 où il a occupé les postes de représentant de la Colombie-Britannique, vice-président, président élu, président et président sortant. Il a également été coordinateur de la formation et président du conseil du JCTR.

Gil a participé activement à la coordination du déménagement du siège social de la SCTR de Winnipeg à Ottawa et à l'embauche du premier directeur général à temps plein. Il a de nouveau présidé la BCSRT de 2008 à 2010 où il a participé à des échanges soutenus avec le ministère de la Santé de la Colombie-Britannique sur le besoin d'établir des modalités de réglementation pour les thérapeutes respiratoires de la province.

Gilbert Vergilio a obtenu son agrément supérieur de la SCTR en 1994. Il a établi des services cliniques en TR à l'hôpital St Paul donnant lieu à de nombreuses descriptions de travail pour les TR et la croissance des services de 11 à 50 membres du personnel. Il a aussi étendu le rôle des TR dans le secteur clinique de la cardiologie au même hôpital (cathétérisme et perfusion).

Tout au long de sa carrière, Gil a occupé divers postes de leadership en soins de la santé et en éducation, notamment son poste actuel à la Fraser Health Authority à titre de consultant en amélioration de la qualité où il s'occupe d'initiatives d'améliorations régionales. Depuis 15 ans, Gil est visiteur d'Agrément Canada et il est conseiller en éducation à l'Association canadienne des soins de santé.

Titulaire d'une maîtrise en éducation de l'Université Simon Fraser avec spécialisation en leadership administratif, il a suivi des études en gestion de la qualité et en administration de la santé à l'Université de la Saskatchewan.

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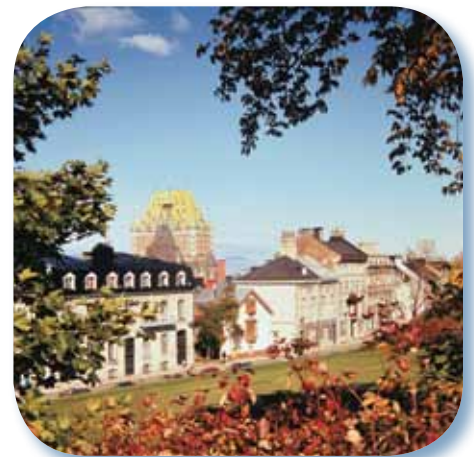
