

Collaborative Teamwork: How the Outcomes of Interprofessional Education Enhance Multidisciplinary Communication and Patient Outcomes

Session Abstract

Interprofessional Education (IPE) has been increasingly identified as a crucial component to forming proficient healthcare teams. When planning an IPE event, there are several factors to consider such as which disciplines should be included, what are the points of emphasis, will it be a simulation or informative event, and how we can ensure a successful event. A successful event would be characterized by ensuring logistical issues are minimized, learning outcomes are achieved, and participants are more confident in interdisciplinary environments. Attention to minor details is key for scenario planning in simulation type IPE events. Logistics must be sorted, equipment must be organized, and the benefit of using standardized patients over mannequins should be evaluated. During a simulation IPE event, there should be a pre-brief to highlight rules of engagement and a debrief following the scenario(s) to encourage self and team reflection. In the pre-brief, introducing the "Team Scheme" method adapted from the Canadian Interprofessional Health Collaboration (CIHC) will aid participants in establishing clear responsibilities and roles amongst the healthcare team and formulate a patient-family centered care plan. Post IPE identifies gaps or highlights areas of overlap between disciplines can help participants evolve as healthcare providers, thus reducing the amount of potential healthcare errors and improving patient outcomes. Pre-event and post-event surveys can be used to examine various aspects of the IPE event such as quality assurance, learning outcomes, self-reflection, and areas for improvement in the planning process. Encouraging IPE amongst multidisciplinary teams can hone positive behaviours surrounding teamwork and collaboration in healthcare. By taking feedback provided on the surveys, we can continue to create new, exciting challenges for future IPE events. The goal is to spark intellectual conversations that will allow participants to prepare for high fidelity and stressful situations once they embark in their respective careers.

Session Objectives

- 1. To examine the effect of interprofessional collaboration on students' learning. To understand how simulation enhances patient outcomes.
- 2. To encourage the adoption of interprofessional education in multidisciplinary healthcare students.
